President's Report – 2023

Three new Board members joined TJF this year. They are Helen Barkley, Mary Martineau, and Helen Shaw, who join Danielle Parenteau as directors. Continuing on the Executive are Rosemary Gibb - President; Mark Cuddy - Secretary, and Dave Gibb - Treasurer.

TJF's mandate is to support programs that promote self-sufficiency, and are relatively small with little or no support from government funding.

Our three week fundraising campaign began on April 16, 2023 with a TJF Sunday service, in collaboration with the Worship Committee. We were pleased to have Arlene McKechnie from TEMBO (Tanzania Education and Micro-Business Opportunity) speak to us that morning about a program that is dedicated to providing the resources necessary for girls from the rural town of Longido, to attain an education. Arlene accompanied her talk with many interesting slides.

We had 18 submissions for funding this year from which we chose four that best met our mandate:

1. **International Needs Canada (Joyful Heart Centre) - \$5,000** : program for supporting children with cerebral palsy in Kenya; provides support to the mothers for basic supplies and transportation; volunteer run organization.
2. **Healthy Lives International Society (Malawi Water Project) - \$4,000** : TJF provided support to this organization in 2021; important initiative helping the local community to establish and repair wells in order to supply clean water.
3. **Embrace International Foundation - \$5,000** : TJF provided support to this organization in 2021; funding provided to very vulnerable community which normally gets very little support; tangible project results – to help provide home-based rehabilitation services to children with disabilities living in rural western Uganda.
4. **TEMBO - \$5,000** : TJF has supported this organization many times in the past which provides a much needed continuity of support; key program of interest is the life skills training girls receive as they are transitioning from elementary to secondary school; past reports have shown the effectiveness of this activity on the overall success of students.

There have been changes to the TJF website. We received an allegation from PicRights, acting on behalf of Reuters, that three of our photos from 2001, 2002, and 2003 were posted without benefit of a license. As the photos were posted by the TJF committee members from over 20 years ago, there was nothing we could do except negotiate a payment to Reuters of \$600, which was half of the original demand.

The website is now being maintained by Trinity's office administrator so that it can be linked in with Trinity's church website. Thanks to Megan Myles for looking after the past TJF website for many years.

TJF has, to date, made 69 funding awards totalling \$320,710. A number of donations were made this year in memory of Bill Hamilton and Roy Coleman. Our thanks to all TJF supporters.
